# From the Desk of Toby Spanier

A lot has changed since I last wrote in the MARL e-newsletter. In February, MARL class X traveled to Cambodia and Taiwan for their international study tour. Thankfully, we were able to travel and return back to the USA safely without disruption. Then in March our lives were significantly altered due to COVID-19. This pandemic has changed the way most of us have experienced everyday activities. We are managing and navigating MARL, our businesses, farm operations, families, and social interactions like never before. Then on May 25, George Floyd, a 46-year-old black man, was killed by a Minneapolis Police Officer. This symbol of yet another unarmed black person being killed, led to a state, national and global chorus of protests that have called for police reform and anti-racist behavior in institutions and communities.

One key learning I have had through COVID-19 and the global calls for social justice is the value and need for effective leadership during uncertain and chaotic times. We have likely heard chats from the recent protest, "No justice, No Peace". I concur and add "No leadership, No Positive Results". The need for leadership education and development is more important now than ever.

As a leader it is important to understand how the brain functions in uncertain times. Much of our motivation driving social behavior is governed by an overarching organizing principle of minimizing threat and maximizing reward (Gordon, 2000). The SCARF model summarizes the common factors that can activate a reward or threat response in social situations.

The SCARF model involves five domains of human social experience: Status, Certainty, Autonomy, Relatedness and Fairness. Status is about relative importance to others. Certainty concerns being able to predict the future. Autonomy provides a sense of control over events. Relatedness is a sense of safety with others, of friend rather than foe. And fairness is a perception of fair exchange between people. These five domains activate either the 'primary reward' or 'primary threat' circuitry (and associated networks) of the brain.

Although a job is often regarded as a purely economic transaction, in which people exchange their labor for financial compensation, the brain experiences the workplace first and foremost as a social system...

Leaders who understand this dynamic can more effectively engage their colleagues and employees' best talents, support collaborative teams, and create an environment that fosters productive change. Indeed, the ability to intentionally address the social brain in the service of optimal performance will be a distinguishing leadership capability in the uncertain and chaotic years ahead.

In the coming months and year, watch for some exciting and innovative enhancements to the MARL program. We need to continue to innovate and look for ways to meet the leadership needs of our agricultural and rural communities. MARL is more important than ever!
